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

# COMMUNITY FOUNDATIONS LOVE LOCAL


• Established by the local community for the local community with primary funding from local donors

• Serves as intermediary across the region.







# SMALL AMOUNTS OF FUNDING CAN MAKE A BIG IMPACT

• LCCF celebrated our 25th anniversary in 2021 by giving communities we serve an opportunity to fund projects that are meaningful to the places and people they represent.

• \$25,000 was awarded proactively in grants of \$2,777 to community identified projects in each city and village in Lapeer County.

• Built new connections leading to bigger impact.

#### Wayfinding

City of Lapeer installed a new "selfie" sign. A new "Welcome" sign for the Village of North Branch and new banners for the Village of Metamora. The Village of Dryden installed decorative street

signs.

#### Community Pride and Engagement

Village of Clifford installed new flag poles and community notice board.



#### Beautification

Village of Almont installed planters on a bridge on M-53



#### Preservation

Village of Otter Lake used the funding to make critical repairs to their local museum

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## **Grant Basics**

#### **Budgeting for Grants: Developing a budget**

- Proposal narrative and budget should align.
- Application may require a copy of your organizational budget as well as the project budget.
- Project budget may include:
  - Salaries and fringe benefits
  - Facility-related expenses
  - Travel
  - Supplies and equipment
  - Consultants
- Identify allowable and un-allowable costs in the program requirements.
- Delineate costs funded by the grant vs. those funded by other sources
- Revenue includes committed and pending grants, donations, earned income, and in-kind support.







## **Grant Basics**

#### **Budgeting for Grants: Budget narrative**

- Provides context and demonstrates feasibility of the project
- Go into detail about line items in the budget
  - Explain how the line item supports a goal or outcome of the project
  - Explain frequency, associate calculations, associated rates if applicable
